Sunday, May 2, 2021 Sermon Scriptures

Acts 9:11-16 11 And the Lord said to him, "Get up and go to the street called Straight, and inquire at the house of Judas for a man from Tarsus named Saul, for he is praying, 12 and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him, so that he might regain his sight."

13 But Ananias answered, "Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much harm he did to Your saints at Jerusalem; 14 and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who call on Your name." 15 But the Lord said to him, "Go, for he is a chosen instrument of Mine, to bear My name before the Gentiles and kings and the sons of Israel; 16 for I will show him how much he must suffer for My name's sake."

<u>2 Cor. 11:21-24</u> <u>21</u> To my shame I must say that we have been weak by comparison. ¶ But in whatever respect anyone else is bold — I speak in foolishness — I am just as bold myself. <u>22</u> Are they Hebrews? So am I. Are they Israelites? So am I. Are they descendants of Abraham? So am I. <u>23</u> Are they servants of Christ? — I speak as if insane — I more so; in far more labors, in far more imprisonments, beaten times without number, often in danger of death. <u>24</u> Five times I received from the Jews thirty-nine lashes.

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<u>2 Cor. 11:25</u> Three times I was **beaten with rods**, once I was **stoned**, **three times** I was shipwrecked, a **night and a day I have spent in the deep**.

<u>Acts 27:1</u> ¶ When it was decided that we would sail for Italy, they proceeded to deliver Paul and some other prisoners to a centurion of the Augustan cohort named Julius.

<u>Acts 27:2</u> And embarking in an Adramyttian ship, which was about to sail to the regions along the coast of Asia, we put out to sea accompanied by **Aristarchus**, a **Macedonian** of **Thessalonica**.

<u>Acts 19:29</u> The city was filled with the confusion, and they rushed with one accord into the theater, **dragging along Gaius and Aristarchus**, Paul's **traveling companions** from Macedonia.

<u>Col. 4:10a</u> ¶ Aristarchus, my fellow prisoner, sends you his greetings; and *also* Barnabas's cousin Mark (about whom you received instructions; if he comes to you, welcome him);

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Acts 27:3 The next day we put in at Sidon; and Julius treated Paul with consideration and

allowed him to go to his friends and receive care.

Acts 27:4-6 4 From there we put out to sea and sailed under the shelter of Cyprus because the winds were contrary. 5 When we had sailed through the sea along the coast of Cilicia and Pamphylia, we landed at Myra in Lycia. 6 There the centurion found an Alexandrian ship sailing for Italy, and he put us aboard it.

Acts 27:7, 8 7 When we had sailed slowly for a good many days, and with difficulty had arrived off Cnidus, since the wind did not permit us to go farther, we sailed under the shelter of Crete, off Salmone; 8 and with difficulty sailing past it we came to a place called Fair Havens, near which was the city of Lasea.

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Acts 27:9-10 9 ¶ When considerable time had passed and the voyage was now dangerous, since even the fast was already over, Paul began to admonish them, 10 and said to them, "Men, I perceive that the voyage will certainly be with damage and great loss, not only of the cargo and the ship, but also of our lives."

<u>Rev. 20:13</u> And the sea gave up the dead which were in it, and death and Hades gave up the dead which were in them; and they were judged, every one *of them* according to their deeds.

Acts 27:11-13 11 But the centurion was more persuaded by the pilot and the captain of the ship than by what was being said by Paul. 12 Because the harbor was not suitable for wintering, the majority reached a decision to put out to sea from there, if somehow they could reach Phoenix, a harbor of Crete, facing southwest and northwest, and spend the winter there. 13 ¶ When a moderate south wind came up, supposing that they had attained their purpose, they weighed anchor and began sailing along Crete, close inshore.

Acts 27:14-20 14 But before very long there rushed down from the land a violent 15 and when the ship was caught in it and could not face the wind, called Euraquilo; wind, we gave way to it and let ourselves be driven along. **16** Running under the shelter of a small island called Clauda, we were scarcely able to get the ship's boat 17 After they had hoisted it up, they used supporting cables in under control. undergirding the ship; and fearing that they might run aground on the shallows of Syrtis, they let down the sea anchor and in this way let themselves be driven along. 18 The next day as we were being violently storm-tossed, they began to jettison the 19 and on the third day they threw the ship's tackle overboard with their cargo: 20 Since neither sun nor stars appeared for many days, and no small own hands. storm was assailing us, from then on all hope of our being saved was gradually abandoned.

Acts 27:21-26 21 ¶ When they had gone a long time without food, then Paul stood up in their midst and said, "Men, you ought to have followed my advice and not to have set sail from Crete and incurred this damage and loss.

<u>22</u> "Yet now I urge you to keep up your courage, for there will be no loss of life among you, but only of the ship. <u>23</u> "For this very night an angel of the God to whom I belong and whom I serve stood before me, <u>24</u> saying, 'Do not be afraid, Paul; you must stand before Caesar; and behold, God has granted you all those who are sailing with you.' <u>25</u> "Therefore, keep up your courage, men, for I believe God that it will turn out exactly as I have been told. <u>26</u> "But we must run aground on a certain island."

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Acts 27:27-32 27 ¶ But when the fourteenth night came, as we were being driven about in the Adriatic Sea, about midnight the sailors began to surmise that they were approaching some land. 28 They took soundings and found it to be twenty fathoms; and a little farther on they took another sounding and found it to be fifteen fathoms.

29 Fearing that we might run aground somewhere on the rocks, they cast four anchors from the stern and wished for daybreak. 30 But as the sailors were trying to escape from the ship and had let down the ship's boat into the sea, on the pretense of intending to lay out anchors from the bow, 31 Paul said to the centurion and to the soldiers, "Unless these men remain in the ship, you yourselves cannot be saved."

32 Then the soldiers cut away the ropes of the ship's boat and let it fall away.

Acts 27:33-37 33 ¶ Until the day was about to dawn, Paul was encouraging them all to take some food, saying, "Today is the fourteenth day that you have been constantly watching and going without eating, having taken nothing. 34 "Therefore I encourage you to take some food, for this is for your preservation, for not a hair from the head of any of you will perish." 35 Having said this, he took bread and gave thanks to God in the presence of all, and he broke it and began to eat. 36 All of them were encouraged and they themselves also took food. 37 All of us in the ship were two hundred and seventy-six persons.

<u>Acts 27:38-40</u> 38 When they had eaten enough, they *began* to lighten the ship by throwing out the wheat into the sea. 39 ¶ When day came, they could not recognize the land; but they did observe a bay with a beach, and they resolved to drive the ship onto it if they could. 40 And casting off the anchors, they left them in the sea while at the same time they were loosening the ropes of the rudders; and hoisting the foresail to the wind, they were heading for the beach.

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<u>Acts 27:41</u> But striking a reef where two seas met, they ran the vessel aground; and the prow stuck fast and remained immovable, but the stern began to be broken up by the force of the waves.

Acts 27:42 The soldiers' plan was to kill the prisoners, so that none of them would swim away and escape; 43 but the centurion, wanting to bring Paul safely through, kept them from their intention, and commanded that those who could swim should jump overboard first and get to land, 44 and the rest should follow, some on planks, and others on various things from the ship. And so it happened that they all were brought safely to land.

Acts 12:18, 19 18 ¶ Now when day came, there was no small disturbance among the soldiers *as to* what could have become of Peter. 19 When Herod had searched for him and had not found him, he examined the guards and ordered that they be led away to execution. Then he went down from Judea to Caesarea and was spending time there.

Acts 28:1, 2 1 ¶ When they had been brought safely through, then we found out that the island was called Malta. 2 The natives showed us extraordinary kindness; for because of the rain that had set in and because of the cold, they kindled a fire and received us all.

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Acts 28:3-6 3 But when Paul had gathered a bundle of sticks and laid them on the fire, a viper came out because of the heat and fastened itself on his hand.

4 When the natives saw the creature hanging from his hand, they began saying to one another, "Undoubtedly this man is a murderer, and though he has been saved from the sea, justice has not allowed him to live." 5 However he shook the creature off into the fire and suffered no harm. 6 But they were expecting that he was about to swell up or suddenly fall down dead. But after they had waited a long time and had seen nothing unusual happen to him, they changed their minds and began to say that he was a god.

Acts 28:7-9 ¶ Now in the neighborhood of that place were lands belonging to the leading man of the island, named Publius, who welcomed us and entertained us courteously three days. 8 And it happened that the father of Publius was lying in bed afflicted with recurrent fever and dysentery; and Paul went in to see him and after he had prayed, he laid his hands on him and healed him. 9 After this had happened, the rest of the people on the island who had diseases were coming to him and getting cured.

Acts 28:10 They also honored us with many marks of respect; and when we were setting sail, they supplied us with all we needed.

Acts 28:11-14 11 ¶ At the end of three months we set sail on an Alexandrian ship which had wintered at the island, and which had the Twin Brothers for its figurehead.

12 After we put in at Syracuse, we stayed there for three days.

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<u>13</u> From there we sailed around and arrived at Rhegium, and a day later a south wind sprang up, and on the second day we came to Puteoli.

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<u>14</u> There we **found** *some* **brethren**, and were invited to stay **with them for seven days**; and thus we **came to Rome**.

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
